- I took this course because I was interested in learning more about African politics and the nature of interventions in conflict zones.
- I'm interested in the field of international relations and public policy, especially in Africa since I'm from an African country.

4 - What did you value most about this course? In what ways did the course meet your expectations? Explain why you would or would not recommend this course.

- The professor was amazing at explaining the material and really deconstructing the topics. It is not the type of neoliberal perspective I've become used to from the poli sci department. Severine is a fantastic professor and is truly passionate about the topic, and it really reflects on her work and lecturing.
- The readings were really valuable -- I learned a lot about both conflict and peacekeeping/peacebuilding.

- I valued the frameworks I learned because they're able to be applied to any other conflict, not just confined to African conflicts. This class met my expectations of being able to understand the different conflicts in Africa, their possible root causes, why some conflicts are still not resolved, and what we need to do to change in order to make international intervention more effective and sustainable. I would recommend this course to someone who is interested in the topic and willing to put in the work to understand the concepts and do the readings.
- I really valued how Prof Autesserre would share her personal insight and stories on the matter, I thought it was really interesting. It met my expectations in that I learned a lot about a region I previously didn't know anything about. I would recommend this course but only to people who understand and can handle the course load.
- I value the structure of the course and the knowledge of Professor Autessere most. I recommend this course to political science majors even if their focus isn't necessarily Africa
- I valued how complete it was. It covered the different causes for conflict, different solutions, stuff that works, stuff that doesn't, why, why not, etc. The readings and the lectures wove theory into real -life case studies to show how conditional and contextual everything is, and drove home the importance of having a correct and thorough understanding of conflicts in order to have positive impact. I loved this course, and am always recommending it to people.
- This course was incredibly well structured, and Professor Autesserre is an excellent lecturer and expert on the subject of the class. She was often able to speak from personal experience, which made the class even more fascinating than the subject matter already did.
- I valued the structure of the course and the way in which it encouraged students to think about scholarly debates in the field of political science. I enjoyed analyzing the different approaches to analyzing civil conflicts in Africa. It also enabled me to learn more about countries I had spent time in when I was younger.
- This course exceeded my expectations. The fact that this course is taught by an authority in the matter added to my interest in taking this course. Everything in syllabus was throughly covered, and more: Prof. Autesserre, is very open, and responsive, to suggestions. It's very apparent she's very passionate about what she does and that she wants every one of her students to their best, and learn the most out of her course. Her enthusiasm is highly contagious. - Prof. Autesserre's professional and personal experiences with journalism, peacebuilding, and researching really made the class material very colorful; often she could provide personal anecdotes that illustrated the concepts that we learned in theory from the readings and the lectures. She also structured the class around class discussions, which did a great job building on our critical thinking skills and also made the class more engaging. This class has far surpassed my expectations, and I really feel that I learned a lot (in terms of content as well as skills), and I truly enjoyed attending class each week
- Professor Autesserre's knowledge and expertise in the subject and field. I would say it met my expectations as I wanted to learn more about African civil wars and I was able to do that through my own personal research for essays, case studies looked at in lectures, and the readings.
- Professor Autesserre is extremely clear in her lectures and the readings were extremely helpful in informing her lectures. I would recommend this course solely because of Professor Autesserre's teaching style and the way she ensures that all students are capable of accessing her lectures.

- I think that the readings could have been from more diverse sources. There were not often many female scholars and there were no scholars from the continent on the required readings portion of the syllabus. I think that different perspectives are key to analyzing the various debates in the field.
- I can't think of anything that could improve this course. Maybe, more guests? For example, peace activist Leymah Gbowee's talk was truly life-changing. There's no other way to depict the impact of her talks. Her transforming wisdom and empathy goes way beyond the subject matter. She's really a life-enhancer, and I'm left wondering whether other —living— authors read on the lectures would've made a similar impact.
- Sometimes I felt that our engagement with the readings was a bit superficial, although I understand not everybody comes from a political science background and may not be experienced critically analyzing the content. While it was helpful going over and clarifying the content of the readings, I think it would have been more interesting actually to get deeper into the material and really get critical with the author's arguments.
- I have no idea if it's feasible, but maybe instead of having one single lecture on Tuesday, it can be split into Tuesday and Thursday. I only say this becaues on some days, I found it difficult to really pay attention for such an extended period of time even if we had breaks. But also, having one lecture on Tuesday was beneficial because we were able to cover so much in depth, which could then be expanded on in the sections.

I felt as though I spent too much time learning the background of the countries that I was analyzing than thinking about the theoretical debates and using them to evaluate different cases. Further, this is not a seminar or graduate level class, yet the level of independent research made matched my seminar classes.

It put an immense amount of pressure on me and my classmates to try to research and write a final paper (equivalent to a final exam I guess) in the last two weeks of class, when we're mean to try to be learning and and revising for all of our other classes. - The course help me see the issues examined in a different perspective that other courses on Africa did, and in so doing, it sparked other ways in which I will approach e.g. war and peace, colonization, the concepts of conflict and violence and ethnicity and identity, the history of slavery, and many other topics concerning Africa but also the rest of the world, as the themes are quite similar.
- Yes, this class was by far the most interesting one I had taken this semester, and I also liked engaging with Prof. Autesserre and my classmates in the discussions, which made me want to put in extra effort to make the class more engaging for myself.
- I would say it inspired me to research more about a particular country for my essays. There was a country that we rarely touched upon in class, but I was so fascinated by it that I wrote all of my essays based on this country. And I wouldn't have done that if Professor Autesserre hadn't given us the freedom to do that, and also if I hadn't been so interested in the class material that I wanted to read more about other countries that all the frameworks we learnt in class could apply to.
- Yes. The fact that we were able to choose our own country case studies throughout the course helped me to gain an in depth understanding of a conflict (Sierra Leone) through the course of the term.

- I don't think I was able to do beyond what was required because it was already a lot of reading. It is impossible for us to read this much readings when we are extremely busy with other courses and activities.
- The course has made me want to conduct my own research and remain observant to the problems facing African nations today.
- Yes, because the classes opened up the possibility of studying cases that were not largely explored in session. In my case, the conflict I chose to delve into was the Malian Civil War, and the extra effort I put into it not only helped me learn substantially from the conflict itself, but it also helped me understand the concepts and dynamics explored in class.
- The passion displayed by the professor and the T.A.s inspired me to perfect my essays in the best way possible. I am hoping that this is reflected in my final grade.
- This class inspired me to put extra effort into my essays because I found the material really interesting and important. However, I repeatedly felt frustrated by the writing assignments. I wish that the first and/or second paper just had us evaluate the ideas we had covered in class and the last paper focused on independent research. It felt like a heavy-load to be expected to evaluate complicated theoretical debates and apply them to cases three times throughout the semester.

The social sciences don't really encourage students to really engage with one another and I believe that students had a lot to offer, but there were few opportunities to engage with them intellectually. I think something like a group project would greatly improve classroom dynamics and understanding of the material through collective engagement.

- While I did appreciate the readings, I think the volume of the readings was a little bit too much. I also think that some of the readings were biographies of survivors of war or their personal experiences, like when our required reading was from Mighty Be Our Powers.
